## • Paper Tigers Screening/Adverse Childhood Experiences

Amber Mehta and JeNell Buchanan described their experience watching the Adverse Childhood Experiences film called *Paper Tigers* at a screening hosted by the Snohomish Health District in Everett. *Paper Tigers* is an intimate look into the lives of students at Lincoln High School, an alternative school that specializes in educating traumatized youth in Walla Walla, WA.

#### **Coalition Action**

The Coalition voted to organize a screening of Paper Tigers for our community. Amber Mehta, JeNell Buchanan, Mary Myers, Paola Saldana and Kayleigh Shaw volunteered to be on the planning committee.

#### • Youth Coalition Report

The Youth Coalition continues to meet and has maintained a size of 20+ members. The Coalition is purchasing supplies to advance their You Are Not Alone campaign and is planning activities and strategies that enhance connectedness to helping peers and adults to reduce the risk factor *Friends Who Engage in the Problem Behavior*.

#### **o** Community Checkbox Grant Award

The Online Documentation and Support System, a collective impact measurement tool that will help the Coalition to better tell its' story, has been renamed Community Checkbox by the University of Kansas. The Division of Behavioral Health and Recovery is working on a Coalition contract amendment before the Coalition can move forward with the tool. Once the upline DBHR contract is in place, the Coalition will subcontract for a subscription to the Community Checkbox, 10 hours of technical assistance and training.

#### • Board of Health Draft Vaping Ordinance

The Snohomish County Board of Health released a draft vaping ordinance after conducting summer listening sessions that would apply Smoking in Public Places regulations to vaping sales and use across Snohomish County. A revised ordinance summary is available online by clicking <u>here</u>.

The Coalition identified Vaping policy education and advocacy in its 2015 Strategic Plan Update, and provided testimony to the Board of Health in August. Once the Board of Health Ordinance has been adopted, the Coalition will identify gaps it would like to address with local policy makers.

#### Coalition Work Session

Coalition members reviewed the **Annual Community Survey** and broke into two groups to discuss and propose the addition of custom survey questions. Group 1 discussed adding Vaping knowledge and policy opinion questions while Group 2 discussed adding Mental Health awareness and preparedness questions.

# Member Updates

Jim Bloss discussed mobilizing the faith community to engage in mental health outreach. He indicated his
organization, the Snohomish County chapter of the National Alliance on Mental Illness, was looking for
local partners among Monroe's faith community.

• Coalition members Chris Gray and Timothy Jackson from Housing Hope announced the Ribbon Cutting Ceremony at Monroe Family Village set for Friday, October 30.
