Call to Order

October meeting of the Monroe Community Coalition was called to order at 1PM by Tom MacIntyre. The October agenda included a community spotlight on foster care and training on restorative practices.

• Community Spotlight: Fostering Together

Danielle Martin, from Fostering Together, presented on her agency's mission to find and support foster families. The program aims to ensure safe, loving foster families are available to meet the diverse needs of abused and neglected youth. Fostering Together works to increase the number of foster families across Western Washington, helps families with the licensing process, and provides ongoing support to ensure foster family success.



Ms. Martin also identified five areas of support needed in Monroe:

- 1. Volunteers for the Office Moms & Dads program, an endeavor that brings in caring adults to the DSHS office to comfort and support children just removed from home and who are awaiting placement.
- 2. Donations to Fostering Together, including school supplies and cash.
- 3. Volunteers for Family Night.
- 4. Appreciation for DSHS staff (meals, cards, notes of support, etc.)
- 5. Support for Foster Parents.

Restorative Practices in Monroe


Jeannette Siemers from Monroe High School and Blake Baird from Leaders in Learning High School were recently trained in the Restorative Practices Model by the International Institute for Restorative Practices. They trained the Coalition to build our understanding in how and why this model will be increasingly used throughout the school district.

What Is Restorative Practices?

Restorative practices is a new field of study that builds healthy schools and communities, increases social capital, reduces the impact of crime, decreases antisocial behavior, repairs harm and restores relationships.

The fundamental premise of this model is that people are happier, more cooperative and productive, and more likely to make positive changes when those in positions of authority do things with them, rather than to them or for them. At its most basic level, restorative practices are about building relationship to address and repair harm and wrong doing.

The model uses several evidence-based and research-based practices while facilitating a restorative conference between victim and perpetrator, including motivational interviewing and restorative circles, to move past punishment into repair.
